## WHERE DOES YOUR FAMILY'S GPS LEAD

After 36 years of working in higher education, I continue to be amazed that in the one class I teach during spring semesters, at least one student every year tells me that I am the first person of color she or he ever had for a teacher. This is 2017!

In higher education, we talk about the importance of exposure to diversity because we live in a world with problems of global proportions that require problem solving and innovation by people from different racial and ethnic and backgrounds working together from around the world.

I am equally surprised at the number of students who arrive on a college campus and tell us that they have never done volunteer work or have little knowledge that there are people in our communities who are homeless, starving and destitute. And what is more surprising is that some of our most privileged students have little understanding that the homeless, starving and destitute are also their brothers and sisters (in Christ).

When my dad was stationed in the Canal Zone in Panama and I was about 8 years old, I remember a village of homes burning to the ground in Panama City. The news traveled quickly that hundreds of Panamanians were living in a tent city. The Chapel on the Army Post where we lived started a food and clothing drive that many, many Americans supported. For the first week, my mom and dad would join in with other military service people to help take food and clothing to the tent city. I always accompanied my mom and helped give out food and play with the other little homeless girls my age. But when I asked my American friends who lived on the Army Post with me if they wanted to come along, they would tell me their parents did not want them to see the devastation or play with homeless kids who might have diseases.

That was probably the beginning of my education about the privilege I had as a little girl with a food, shelter and clothing and the importance of me giving away some of my clothes and helping to feed other children like me who had no food. I always remember my mom saying, "Zoila, there but for the grace of God, go I." In other words, my family's security could have vanished too.

As I reflect on that tragic experience of others so long ago and the experiences I have today with college age youth, I often wonder what are the ways in which parents are exposing their children to the rich diversity of our world so that they understand that there are differences not only in race and ethnicity but socio-economic status, religion and yes, the worldviews of others. And more important, that our humanity connects us to one another should never be forgotten.

The opportunity to provide exposure to difference and engage our children in discussions about equity and justice is an important way of preparing them for the inevitable - a world that is going to be so much more diverse and technologically advanced than ours is, even today.

On behalf of the Journeying Toward Justice Group, we hope that you and your family will make our Fall Speaker Series one of the many stops along the way to embracing diversity. We believe that you will find the Fall Speaker Series provocative, compelling and worthy of family conversations in your home. Zoila Airall
